

The girls had already visited the Thomas Edison and Henry Ford Winter Estate in Fort Myers, but we headed for McGregor Boulevard anyway and pulled up at the new Art of the Olympians Museum and Gallery, where the artwork of more than 30 Olympic athletes, including Peggy Fleming, is displayed.

On entering, the

girls were impressed by its spectacular setting on the harbour, with the view of passing boats from the windows almost as enticing as the art within. They were amazed that so many Olympic athletes are also artistically talented. Oils, acrylics, photography, and sculpture...they couldn't make up their minds what they liked best-until they entered the women's room.
